Dear Members of Zion's Lutheran Church,

As our life together as pastor and people begins its' second year, there are some things that we need to focus on together.

At our recent Goal Setting meeting, we established a goal to increase weekly worship attendance to 150 people and weekly educational ministry participation to 75 people.

This will require a deeper commitment from everyone in order to accomplish it. Each member needs to make a renewed effort to attend church each week. As people of God, we are stronger as a group when more of us are present for our organization's primary activity – **WORSHIP.**

Secondly, as this new school year begins, the Zion's faith community gathers weekly for the study of scripture. Please be involved and participate in supporting our Sunday School educational opportunities that will help you (and your children) to grow in your faith and in your relationship with God. We have organized a new Adult Study **Classroom** for adults to use. We are implementing a Children's Church program to help our children learn more about the Bible and how to participate in worship. Adults should especially pay attention to the Saturday, October 17 Day of **Learning** that is being prepared. 4- 90 minute class periods will provide wonderful opportunities

for **Zion's leaders and members to grow.** There will be many talented teachers present. Watch for the specific details and sign up. Our goal is to have 25 - 30 Zion's Lutheran adults participating on Oct. 17 - **LEARN**

Thirdly, pray for your congregation, for its' staff and all of its' volunteers that God's love might be evident in all that we say and do. In this broken and confused world, as faithful people, we know to center our lives (and our time, talents and treasure) on God, but there are many in the world who either have forgotten how to do that, or have never had the opportunity to be involved in a community like Zion's, before.

Invite those who are searching

Invite those who are searching for a church to call home to come with you to Zion's events and worship services. - PRAY

Through the first 2/3's of 2015 the financial picture at Zion's is not good. During the summer, the operating deficit soared above \$20,000. Members are asked to increase their regular giving as they are able. We (people of Zion's) are a generous people because we know that God has been generous to us. Soon, we hope, members and friends will be able to give on-line through the church's website. God loves joyful, cheerful givers who recognize the good work being done by their congregation. Many lives are being touched with the love of Christ. - GIVE

I hope to see you in worship in September. I pray that you will be involved in doing God's Work with your hands, feet and hearts wherever your work and travels take you in the world. May God be a part of our gatherings in the fall days ahead.

Our Beautiful home

In November 2013, a series of deadly tornadoes ripped through Illinois. In the small town of Brookport, 44 homes were destroyed and 127 were severely damaged. Worse, many people were injured and some lost their lives.

Ray and Marcina Warfield happened to be visiting family elsewhere that day and felt lucky to have escaped the storm. But when they came home, they realized they had not been completely spared.

The Warfields' mobile home had been destroyed by the tornado. The couple had always lived in mobile homes, so when they received assistance from FEMA, it seemed only natural to purchase another. However, after connecting with a case manager through the long-term recovery group in Illinois, supported in part by Lutheran Disaster Response through Lutheran Social Services of Illinois, the Warfields decided that building a house would be better investment.

Through donations, volunteer efforts and gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response, the Warfields were able to move into their new home. Never had they thought they would be able to live in a grounded home. The sense of safety was well worth the investment – and they couldn't be more grateful.

Every night after the work crews and volunteers went home, Ray and Marcina would help by cleaning up the work site and throwing out trash. During work days, Marcina would set up chairs in the shade so workers could take t heir breaks in comfort, and she would talk with them and express her family's gratitude.

"We are so thankful," Marcina says. "We are tickled with our beautiful home."

Fall 2015

Dear Members of Zion's Lutheran Church,

I have now completed my first year of service as your Pastor. I have gotten familiar with life at Zion's in these past months. I have visited with many of you in your homes. Over the past 12 months, the subject of human sexuality has been on the agenda of our monthly Congregation Council meetings.

In June, our Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod again discussed this issue and acted. The Reading Eagle published a report on the assembly in Reading but Bishop Samuel Zeiser was not happy with their coverage of the discussion. Jim and Betty Hirko served as Zion's delegates to the Assembly. Jim did a faithful job in fairly presenting the assembly actions to the congregation on the Sunday after that assembly. I was grateful for Jim's honesty and integrity that day.

There was some follow-up discussion at June's Congregation Council meeting. That discussion led to an active family of the congregation deciding to seek membership elsewhere, outside of the ELCA. In late June, the Supreme Court announced its latest decision, prompting further discussion.

There appears to be a desire on the part of Zion's members to have an indepth study of scripture and of our ELCA history in dealing with this subject. The leadership of the congregation has prayerfully considered how to proceed in a manner that will be helpful to all those who wish to be a part of that conversation. The decisions of our national church body and our synod were not entered into lightly or quickly. Votes required % majorities before actions were adopted. The issue was studied by many congregations for more than a decade.

As people of Zion's Lutheran prepare for a time of study and conversation on human sexuality, please use the resources that are available at www.elca.org/socialstatements to help you in your own study process. I will be using them. Please also recognize that many ELCA congregations have actively participated in Bible study, prayer and discernment over the past 15 years or more. I participated in those studies with my previous congregation. Please also recognize that the faith community of Zion's already includes those who are of homosexual orientation. I know that 21st century families need help and prayer in dealing with the dynamic relationships that exist between generations that are each called to be faithful to the teachings of the Christian faith.

I have been called to serve as the Pastor of a diverse group of human beings who have been in fellowship with one another and with the wider Lutheran church community for the past 256 years. Please prayerfully be a part of this discussion. Please hold our congregation's leadership in your prayers at this time. I anticipate a 6 week Wednesday evening study group to begin this fall. Participants should be able to commit to attending all 6 sessions. There will be some assigned reading before the study group begins. Please indicate your interest in this study by signing up on my office door.
