Annual Minutes from January 17, 2016

The meeting was brought to order by President, Jim Hirko at 12:32 PM. The attendance was 57.

- I. Devotion was provided by Pastor Bruce Osterhout
- II. Presentation of the Agenda Mitch Shestok asked for an open discussion to discuss C.12.05.C. This was added to the new business section under letter D.
- III. Secretary's Report A correction to the minutes for the annual meeting on January 18, 2015 was made. Rita Decker's term on audit committee should be a 3 year term. John Smith's term on audit committee should be a 2 year term. Virginia Werley made a motion to accept the report with corrections and Janine Dreibelbis seconded the motion. Motion passed.

IV. Elections

- a. 2015 Nominating Committee Report was given. Currently we have 5 positions open (1-1 year term, 4-3 year terms)
- b. Church Council
 - i. Brian Moroney 1 year term
 - ii. Eileen Puglia 3 year term
 - iii. Mitch Shestok 3 year term
 - iv. Susan Lutz -3 year term

One 3 year term is still open and no one was willing to run for that position at this time.

- c. Nominating Committee
 - i. Bettie Hirko 3 year term January 2016 2019
- d. Audit Committee
 - i. Gary Rothermel 3 year term January 2016 2019

Jeanette Heckman made a motion to close nominations. Dan Geist seconded the motion. Motion passed.

- V. Pastor's Report as written Mitch Shestok mentioned that a typo occurred with spelling Don Ryan's name and before Karen Freeman's name the word das should be as. Also, Family Promise was held at the church the week of December 20-27. Dan Geist inquired if we would be continuing with the Saturday services, and he stated that we will be continuing.
- VI. Committee Reports Mitch Shestok has made a motion and seconded by Henry Seidel that all committees that are listed in the constitution are listed on the annual report on page 3. Motion passed.
 - a. Fellowship Committee The committee has asked for help with the coffee bar.
 - b. Property Committee Mike Puglia thanked the volunteers who help with the various projects that go on at church. Please consider filling out the

Time and Talent Sheet. If you are able to help volunteer with the Property Committee, Mike Puglia explained that a project to consider for a Capital Campaign would be our roof. John Smith also explained that a Heating Study has been done in the past. At this time, our heating system is ok but we should also be considering the fact that we may need to look at our heating system. A question was raised by Mitch Shestok as to what happened with the goals that were created. Eileen Puglia explained that a group met to work on the wording of the goals and assigning dates for completion. Pastor Osterhout explained that we are currently working on the goals. Jim Hirko commented that copies of the goals will be made available for anyone who would like a copy.

- c. Personnel Committee Sandra Moroney complimented the committee on finding our choir director
- d. Community Garden Eileen Puglia mentioned that the committee still has room for additional committee members and volunteers to help in the garden. She also thanked everyone for their help.
- e. Endowment Fund Committee Joe Leone, Mabel Fry, Mary Mengle, Ruth Bensinger, Mitch Shestok are members of the committee. \$2700 was spent this past year. Distributions were made for a safe purchased for holding weekly collections, local outreach programs, re-keying the church and new key box, rebidding of the carbon filter, Hamburg EMS, Shoemakersville Pool and Family Promise. \$3400 will be able to be spent for the 2016 year. This money is to cover the "out of the box" type coverages.
- f. Annual Report Mitch Shestok asked if the 2015 Membership record was reviewed prior to the annual report being compiled. Brian Moroney explained that Elaine Schroeder was working on this, but since she has left we aren't sure how much was done. Mitch mentioned that per the constitution if someone hasn't communed within 5 years, they are to be removed from the roll. This will be looked at in the next year.
- VII. Auditing Committee Report Dan Geist, Rita Decker, and John Smith audited the books and found that all books balanced.
- VIII. Treasurer's Report Sandra Moroney mentioned that we paid off the air conditioning fund and we made a big comeback at the end of the year to help pay off some of our deficit. Motion to accept the treasurer's report as presented was made by Jeanette Heckman and seconded by Carol Rothermel. Motion passed.
- IX. New Business
 - a. Constitution Amendment A motion was made by Mitch Shestok and Sandra Moroney to vote on the three Constitution amendments as one body. Motion passed. A motion was made by Sandra Moroney and seconded by Janine Dreibelbis to approve the amendments as presented in the annual report. Motion passed.

- b. Media Committee Amendment Bottom of page 33. This should have been listed as a continuing resolution for the media committee. This will be brought before the February 2016 council meeting, and a 2/3 vote will need to take place for this to be able to move forward. Jerry O'Brien mentioned that committee members will be needed; if anyone is interested, please contact Jerry. A discussion took place about the fact that the media committee currently does not have a line in the budget and they felt that most of the expenses would go through property committee. Mike Puglia expressed concern about having the expenses coming through property and feels that the media committee should have a line item. Bettie Hirko would like the media committee to have a line item and see that people step up and become part of this committee and have this group take our church to the next level in terms of media. Sandra Moroney will add an income and expense line and list it as zero until the committee is formed and we know which direction the committee will be going in 2017.
- c. Anniversary Pavilion Project The 50th Anniversary of this building will be in 2019.
- d. C.12.05.C Mitch Shestok mentioned that if the budget is beyond 10% of the annual budget, it needs to be brought to the attention of the congregation. A motion was made by Bettie Hirko and seconded by Linda Deibler that there is no point in discussing this topic. Motion passed.

X. 2016 Proposed Budget

- a. Simply Giving Joe Leone did a presentation on Simply Giving which is through Thrivent, and this is our online giving program through Vanco Services. It was mentioned about possibly creating something that can be placed in the offering basket mentioning that you contributed online. (A little book mark type thing that could be kept in the pews or maybe in the back of the church for people to pick up prior to church starting and place in the offering basket during the collection)
- b. Profit and Loss Summary Trend Analysis Joe Leone presented this analysis.
- c. Sandra Moroney mentioned that on line item #93 on page 30 should have been budgeted for an amount larger than \$1800. It should be increased to \$3600. We will add \$1800 to the general income to make it \$201,800. A motion was made by Bettie Hirko to accept Sandra Moroney's recommendation.

The meeting was suspended at 2:27 PM due to the lack of a quorum.

The meeting was reconvened on February 14, 2016 at 11:50 AM with 56 people present.

The meeting started with reading the motion that was on the floor prior to our suspending the meeting. The motion was made by Bettie Hirko to accept

Sandra Moroney's recommendation and seconded by Cleta Borkey. Motion passed.

d. Discussion ensued about our decrease in benevolence. Henry Seidel and Sandra Moroney explained that we pay a percentage each month towards benevolence. Our benevolence last year was 9.43% and is down this year to 6.66%. Nancy Dresher made a motion to restore the benevolence to the 9% of the budget which would mean adding \$5,798 to our budget and was seconded by Rita Decker. Voted in favor – 21, Opposed – 28, Abstention – 1. The motion did not pass.
Joe Leone made a motion that if we are in the black and have met all our obligations and have additional funds, we would provide to the Synod

additional funds up to the 9% of our budget. This was seconded by Bettie

e. A motion was made by Carol Rothermel to accept the budget and seconded by Bettie Hirko. Motion passed.

Hirko. One person opposed. Motion passed.

- f. In response to our deficit last year, Sandra Moroney reported that at the December & January council meetings it was discussed about borrowing from the Vanguard Account to start the year in the black. A discussion ensued about if we should borrow the money or not. Carol Rothermel made a motion to transfer \$11,000 from the Vanguard fund to our checking account without paying it back and was seconded by Ruth Ann Eyer. Opposed-2, Abstention-1. Motion passed.
- g. Henry Seidel made a motion giving council authorization to borrow up to \$9,000 from the Vanguard Account and put into our checking account which shall be paid back by the end of 2016 if we enter into a deficit. This was seconded by Ruth Wilhelm. Voted in favor-35, Opposed -9, Abstention-0. Motion passed.
- XI. Report of Elections Everyone has a majority vote and was elected to their positions.
- XII. Installation of Council Members Pastor Osterhout would like to install the council members during the worship service instead of at this meeting where more people are present.
- XIII. Adjournment A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Gary Rothermel and seconded by Dan Geist at 12:43 PM. Motion passed





Pastor's Report 2016

"Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power. Put on the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places." These are confusing times that we live in. How do we practice our faith in our daily lives amidst all of the opinions and all of the arguing going on in the world? Actions continue to speak louder than words, don't they? If they do, then we are speaking loudly!

Jesus said: "The second is this. You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Mark 12:31a

Witness this one 8-day period of activity (during one of the busiest weeks of the year for making holiday preparations, December 16 - December 23, 2016) of the people of Zion's Evangelical Lutheran Church of Perry Township (how we are known on Facebook):

Friday, December 16 – Hamburg Salvation Army Angel Tree gifts were distributed from the Hamburg Field House. Gifts for many had been purchased by members and by the Youth of Zion's. All the Angels on the Tree were taken by Zion's Angels.

Saturday, December 17 – Members and friends sang and performed Christmas carols outside of Cabela's and rang the Red Kettle Bells for the Hamburg Salvation Army unit which helps community families in need throughout the year. Have you visited or volunteered at the new Salvation Army Family Store on S. 4th Street in Hamburg yet?

Sunday, December 18 – Individuals from 3 different families began their "sleeping and eating" at church. The cots came in the morning along with our curious guests. Our week of hosting as a part of the Family Promise of Reading and Berks County had begun.

Monday, December 19-5 children in Shoey had enjoyed a visit from Santa the night before; their Christmas suddenly brighter thanks to Shoey Area Lion's Club's Santa deliveries. They were referred to Santa (through United Way) because of Zion's known outreach in the community. Gifts cards to Redner's and Walmart were delivered.

Tuesday, December 20 – Food was hauled from the Greater Berks Food Bank in Shillington to the Hamburg Middle School, loading 4 vehicles and then unloading them. Others helped with the set-up chores inside.

Our Northern Berks Community Garden gifted the recipients with fresh oranges. Our Zion's Boy Scouts were on hand to help take the food out in shopping carts to the vehicles of those who received the food.

Wednesday, December 21 – As Advent drew to a close, Reverse Advent Calendar baskets began rolling into the church office. The Women of Zion's were collecting items to benefit Berks Women in Crisis (now known as SAFE BERKS).

Thursday, December 22 – A fully completed Church Flood Service Emergency Flood Cleanup Bucket was delivered to the church office to benefit this past summer's flood victims in West Virginia, Baton Rouge LA, or in the Carolinas. (Youth 16 and older: watch for the opportunity to participate in Camp Noah, July 8-15, 2017 with Pastor Bruce and other area Lutherans).

Friday, December 23 – Overnight residents at Reading's Opportunity House were served a hot meal by volunteers from Zion's. Zion's members (broken into teams) have been doing this for a long time now.

We, as the people of Zion's Lutheran, accomplished great outreach in these 8 days. We are generous in our in-kind giving to others. We give our warm smiles, our willing backs, our capable minds in service to the world. We network with others in our mission in our community to reach out with love to those in need: people close by us in our neighborhoods, people around our county, and people across our nation, as you can see from the illustrative sentences above.

As the people of Zion, we put our faith into action in the world. We talk and walk the faith road daily. We worship together each week. We study God's Word. We sing God's praises. We pray our prayers. We remain hopeful because we know that the victory has already been won. We know how it ends, regardless of the current conditions.

As you read this annual report, may it be more than statistics to you. May it be more than just following procedure. May it be about our joint witness, our shared legacy of generosity. May it be about the mission of love that our congregation forwards, about the lives that are touched, about the message of hope that is given. May it be about our collective witness to Jesus Christ, about our gifts being used to God's glory.

If you are not already an active participant in all that Zion's does, please step up and help us reach out in this new year of 2017. New Council members are needed to help lead the congregation forward. Meetings are once a month. Offering counters are needed Monday mornings each month. Sunday School and Adult Bible study participants are always encouraged.

We will need garden volunteers come spring, potato harvesters come the fall. There will be grass to mow. We will need to plan for our Morning Bible School in June for our children to enjoy. We welcome Senior Adults who love to gather in fellowship.

Bells and Brass instruments need to be "blown" and shaken to the Glory of God. There are musical notes to be sung, giving praise. The Time and Talents sheets of the past are not helpful anymore. Busy people just check what they are already doing. Not enough people complete them at all. We will search for new ways to get the word out to you as to what our faith community needs to help it grow stronger.

Step out in love in 2017. Volunteer. Don't wait to be asked. Be brave. We are mostly all volunteers, you know. Ask questions. Find out what needs to be done to make our congregation stronger. Be a warrior for Jesus in the 21st century, using the armor that you have been given.

Stand therefore, and fasten the belt of truth around your waist, and put on the breastplate of righteousness. Some 2016 Accomplishments as I reflect on the Past Year, both personally and professionally:

- + Our Zion's "War on Hunger and Poverty" (published in the January 2017 newsletter) outlines all of our work in helping others with food and the necessities of life. This was shared in the newsletter to help prepare members for reading all of the Annual Reports from the Committees. Two families of the congregation were helped through life transitions using the Charity and Emergency Fund.
- + As a delegate from the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, I attended the ELCA Assembly in New Orleans, Louisiana for one week, back in August. I learned much about our wider church at that event.
- + My spouse celebrated her First Ordination Anniversary. Julie continues to serve with the people of Trinity Lutheran Church, Wernersville. She traveled to Honduras with 11 others (Two from Zion's). We continue to figure out, together, how to manage the work of 2 busy congregations. She broke her leg/foot on Friday, December 2. This has slowed us down these past few weeks.

- + I am spearheading the monthly "Faith at the Movies" event at the Hamburg Strand Theatre on behalf of the Northern Berks Ministerium. Following the strong attendance for the movie "Risen" back on Holy Saturday, this monthly event began in September. December 27 saw our largest crowd (49) so far. People have the opportunity to stay and discuss the movie. The Hamburg Strand gets used on an off night, generating some traffic and revenue. The Reading Berks Conference of Churches publicizes the event to a wide audience in their EBLAST each week.
- + Our June Morning Bible School (CAVE QUEST) was great fun. More than 50 of us visited Crystal Cave that Thursday. Good teamwork led by Ruth Wilhelm helped our young people grow in their faith that week.
- + We hosted two weeks of Family Promise, housing families for a week and giving them supper, for one week in May and for one week in December.
- + Mitch Shestok has helped our congregation look at its Parish Register as I continue to get to know all the families connected to our congregation. Mitch did much tedious work that has benefitted our faith community, justifying our handwritten Parish Record with our Church Windows Directory software. This work continues into 2017. Some relationships have been renewed as a result of this.
- + Our youth continue to help serve others, enjoy fellowship, and participate in the life of our congregation. The youth participated in the first area Catechism Retreat at Bear Creek Camp last February. Karen Blandford and Faye Heckman coordinated kitchen duties for the group of 55 people from 10 congregations. (We will go again March 31-April 2, 2017. Register now, please. Any youth in grades 7-12 can go).
- + We hosted friends from Friedens Church, Shartlesville and St. John's Lutheran Church, Hamburg in October, enjoying joint Sunday School, worship, and a luncheon.
- + Amanda Grow began her ministry with us as Administrative Assistant, at the end of February. Her good spirit, warm personality, and capable computer skills have been a blessing. She had much to learn and that learning continues as she approaches her first anniversary working with our very busy church.
- + To all who have contributed in ways large and small, in the past year, I give thanks to God for you. PB

Service and Witness Ministries

Women of the ELCA - 2016

We collected Advent Baskets with personal hygiene items that were donated to Berks Women in Crisis. Thrivent Action Money was used to purchase the baskets. Youth and Catechism Ministry Report - 2016

Youth in Grades 6-12 continue to be involved in the life of Zion's Lutheran Church. The youth of Zion's serve side by side with adult members in serving God and others. Learning to serve and care for others is an important part of helping young people grow in their faith. Youth in Grades 7-9 are taught on Sunday mornings during Sunday School as a part of their catechetical instruction. Five youth "affirmed their faith on Reformation Sunday becoming adult members of the congregation. Any youth in Grades 7-9 is welcome to become a part of this instruction program. Youth are recruited to serve as ushers during worship.

Youth participated in The Potato Project, cutting seed potatoes in the spring and harvesting potatoes in the fall. They colored Easter eggs on Good Friday and hid them for the children on Holy Saturday. They helped out with Opportunity House meals. They slept overnight when Zion's hosted Family Promise in May and December. In November and December, they baked goodies and sold them to raise funds to assist a congregational family with Christmas. They assisted with Bible School in June. One youth is a substitute Sunday school teacher. They continue to serve as acolytes during worship services. One youth, Trevor Fegley, led a discussion about Labyrinths, forming a committee and investigating possible locations. Youth participate in the Orche-Band at Easter and Christmas. They participated in the "Share Your Passions" event during Sunday School in January.

Participating in joint youth activities with the youth and adults of other congregations is another important activity that the youth were engaged in. In late February, 2016, about 55 youth and adults from 10 congregations participated in a weekend retreat at Bear Creek Camp learning about the Apostles Creed and enjoying all of the activities that the camp has to offer. A fall event at Friedens Church in Shartlesville included a Water Walk, a campfire, and supper.

As many Zion's youth are busy with school, after school activities, band, and athletics, it is a challenge to get them together. At times, they gathered for fun activities including a trip to Key Quest, working together to find a way out of a room. They ate pizza and enjoyed the church yard. Unfortunately, no youth participated in the Canoe Trip with the Bishop in May on the Schuylkill River, from Hamburg down to Leesport.

There is no formally organized youth ministry committee at this time. The parents of some of the youth work together to carry out the activities that are decided on by the group and by the youth that are interested in participating. Thank you to everyone who has participated in the activities of the past year providing transportation, supervision, and interacting with our young people.

Welcome & Outreach Report – 2016

The committee reviewed their activities in relation to the Church constitution to ensure they were in alignment. It also has taken responsibility for coordinating Family Promise during the year. Thank you cards were sent throughout the year to individuals who have helped the congregation thrive. Notes were also sent to visitors who have worshiped with us. Bulletins were sent on a monthly basis to the shut-ins within the congregation. Monthly notes were sent to college students on a parent-request basis. Handouts were purchased for the Christmas Eve children sermons.

<u>Happy Knotters – 2016</u>

We have given 121 Quilts to different places throughout the year. Lutheran Relief received 71 of those quilts. The rest of the quilts stayed in our area. Some went to shelters, Women in Crisis and Opportunity House. We appreciate all the things that people have donated to help with putting the quilts together. We are always looking for people to help.

Property Committee Report – 2016

The report this year will highlight several of the larger issues or challenges faced. They are by no means the only issues addressed by the Property Committee in maintaining the church property on a daily basis. Like your home, there are light bulbs to replace, toilets to unclog or fix, faucets to repair, walls to paint, windows to repair, grass to mow, snow to shovel, on and on. To do this, we are currently relying on a small group of volunteers and need more help. You do not have to become a committee member, but if you can help, please let us know in what areas you can offer assistance. Contact any property member for more information or come out to our next meeting (third Thursday of the month) January 19, 2017 at 7 PM.

Highlights of 2016

Heating & AC Systems: A defective outdoor temperature differential sensor was replaced in December 2015 and the pneumatic heating controls adjusted to the new sensor. The repair & warmer weather in the spring helped us accumulate a surplus in our heating fuel account. In November 2016 a circulator pump for the Nave failed (motor capacitor shorted and exploded). As a result of the damage to the motor, a new motor had to be purchased and installed. The fall seasonal service to the furnace has been scheduled, and we should be set for the upcoming winter season. In November 2016 a control board was replaced for an AC unit in the Fellowship Hall that had been out of service for some time. All AC units are now operational.

<u>Water System</u>: December 2015 began our journey as a water supplier and the related DEP reporting. The year did not start out well, as the chlorinator pump failed prior to our registration visit by a DEP employee. We are currently filing our monthly reports and water tests with DEP. In November 2016 the monthly water test failed for positive results present. A request was immediately made to have the chlorinator pump checked on 11/30 and repairs made. We are now doing accelerated testing to ensure our water safety, as required.

Labyrinth Group: Trevor Fegley, a member of Zion's, and a student at Hamburg Area High School, chaired a group of members to explore the possibility of establishing a "Labyrinth" on the grounds of Zion's as his graduation community service project. Trevor explored the roles and responsibilities of forming and working with a committee on a service project, as planning for a labyrinth. A temporary sample labyrinth was constructed on the grounds for the annual picnic so members could get an idea of what a labyrinth is and how it is used in meditation and prayer. The proposal options and estimated costs for a labyrinth project, to be considered by the congregation as a faith community project, can be found elsewhere in this "Annual Report". We hope Trevor gained experience and insight that will benefit him as he moves into adulthood and continuing service to the community.

<u>Comcast Cable & Internet</u>: In December 2015 we entered into an agreement with Comcast to provide cable & improved internet services to the church, with the anticipation of converting our telephone service from Verizon also in March of 2017 when our contract with Verizon expires. Recent issues have occurred with the loss of telephone service for one or more days a week in November for our Verizon service. The conversion to Comcast for telephone service will be made in March, as the Verizon contract expires.

Boy Scout Troop 163 Shed: Our scout troop is in the process of purchasing a larger shed to replace the current old 6x8 shed adjacent to the fuel oil tank off the back parking lot. Placement of the new 10x16 shed will be in the same immediate area and result in the replacement of the current trash area with a new fenced area to the right of the current area. The colors were selected to match the current garden shed. (Editor's Addition: The Boy Scout Shed was delivered and installed on Thursday, December 29. Trash holding area is still in progress.)

<u>Grounds Maintenance</u>: Top soil was purchased to cover exposed tree roots on the grounds. Clean up of fallen tree limbs, trimming of low hanging tree limbs, and removal of a bush invaded by wild rose and poison ivy, was completed. Fall leaf mulching continues in November. Snow shoveling volunteers needed for the winter.

Refrigerator – Fellowship Hall: Our current refrigerator in the Fellowship Hall kitchen, although only a few years old, has several very slow leaks in the evaporator coil that are not repairable. To repair this unit, the evaporator coil needs to be replaced at about ½ the cost of replacing the entire unit. After researching costs and equipment ratings, the Fellowship Committee decided replacement would best serve the church in the long run and will include a budget item for 2017 to replace the refrigerator.

I hope you found the information provided informative, and if you have any questions, please feel free to ask.

Just one more thing - Too often word of mouth to another church member fails to get repair needs to our attention. When you notice something that needs repair by the Property Committee, please write it in the steno notebook found in the "Property Mail Bin" in the office (include your name in case we have questions). Property Committee members check this book regularly and will evaluate any issue reported. You can check the status of your issue by checking the book – we list what action is needed and when completed. Thanks for your help by reporting issues.

Northern Berks Community Garden – 2016

First of all, a huge thank you to everyone for all of their support during our 3rd Garden season. Thanks to our volunteers, who come out as often as they can to help in the garden; and thanks to our supporters, who continue to donate funds and supplies, encourage our efforts, and pray for our ministry.

Our new crop this year was acorn squash. It grew well, and was well received at the pantries. We set a new record with 8,224 pounds of produce grown in the Garden this season. This year, produce was donated to the Northern Berks Food Pantry (Hamburg), Schuylkill Valley Food Pantry, Keystone Military Pantry, Hamburg Salvation Army, Friend Inc. Kutztown, Wyndcliffe Apartments and Franklin and Noble Manor residents. Produce was also donated for this summer's Opportunity House meals prepared by Zion's members. In addition, we were able to purchase and donate 20 bushels of apples for the Hamburg and Schuylkill Valley Food Pantries this fall. That's another 900 pounds of produce, for a total of 9124 pounds donated this year. Wow!

Any donations given to us this Christmas season will be used to purchase fresh produce for local food pantries, so we can continue to provide nutritious food to the needy of our community this winter.

The Northern Berks Community Garden continues to be self-sustaining, with no funds used from Zion's operating budget. We continue to run on support from congregation members and community organizations and businesses. We have been truly blessed by the support of our ministry and look forward to our 4th season in 2017.

On May 9th we held a Flag Retirement ceremony during our normal Troop meeting time to properly and respectfully dispose of old and tattered American Flags. We do this annually, or as needed, depending on the amount of flags collected. With Summer approaching the boys look forward to our last meeting before break, and for good reason....our annual last day water battle!! This is a Troop annual tradition to celebrate the coming of Summer. Next on the agenda, Summer Camp! The Troop attended camp from July 17th – July 23rd this year where we enjoyed the outdoors and completed 53 individual Merit Badges. Between scouts 17 attended. Summer Camp was followed by our annual Perry Park car show on August 14th. This annual event is a great fund raiser that finances almost all of our Troop activities throughout the year. On Monday, November 7th we held a Court of Honor to celebrate recent Scout accomplishments such as Merit Badges and rank advancements.

During the month of December the Troop assisted with the Berks Food Pantry at the Hamburg Middle School on December 13th. Our Troop had a Christmas Party on Decamber 19th before breaking for the Holidays.

During the past few months, the Troop worked with the Zions Committee to replace the old shed that was given to the Troop to use for equipment storage. The she was delivered in mid December. This slightly larger shed will give us enough space for existing equipment plus allow us to remove the large box containing our Cub Scout race track from the Church stage as well as various supplies stored under the stage.

The preceding was just a brief overview of our Troop activities for the year. The Scouts derive much fun and education our boys get out of the Scouting Program. We're all looking forward to another fun-filled year ahead! Below is a listing of our leaders who make this all happen, often behind the scenes. Labyrinth Taskforce Report – 2016
