Dear Members and Friends of Zion's Lutheran Church,

Do you ever notice how selfish and into themselves some people are?

Of course, "church people" never act that way. Having the ability to look at yourself and see your own faults and shortcomings is **something that is supposed to happen** when you are a part of the faith community. You know that phrase that we use in worship. That phrase that is designed to make us all stop, think and reflect, "All have sinned and fall short of the Glory of God." (Romans 3:23) This explains why we all get down on our knees during worship and confess our sins, usually near the beginning of worship.

Our sinful human nature pops up all the time: When we put ourselves above the needs of others. When we put ourselves above the needs of the faith community of which we are a part. When we think that we are better than someone else. When we generalize about some group of people. When we think we know better than: 1. Our God 2. Our Physician 3. Our Law Enforcement Officer 4. Our Children 5. Our Parents 6. Our Teachers. You get the idea. No one of us knows everything although some act like they do. I the writer and you the reader are exempt from this conversation, of course!

Some examples of this behavior come to mind: 1. When someone asks me about having a "private" baptism because our worship times do not fit their schedule. They have placed their own needs over the importance of our faith community. Sometimes our community is weakened because we are just "too busy" for things that matter. 2. When someone on a committee checks their own personal schedule and then too quickly says we can't do that then (obviously believing that "we can't because they can't." Sometimes our mission suffers. 3. Road rage and aggressive drivers. Sometimes people are in too much of hurry. Their selfishness is evident in their driving. 4. Internet "trolls" who blast everything they read. This is, after all, why Facebook provides the ability to block people. 5. Closeminded people who cannot engage in open, honest discussion about anything. They seem to have life and the world all figured out. I wish I did. 6. People who in their conversations, judge, lash out, criticize, and argue all the time without stopping and thinking first. 7. People who have no sympathy, empathy or compassion for the plight or situation of another. You have heard the comments. 8. People who only talk about themselves. The conversation always is steered back to them. 9. People who insist it is "their way and then threaten to hit the highway" (and leave) if they don't get their way. Have I provided enough examples to get you thinking?

Since 1759, the Zion's Lutheran Church faith community has somehow overcome human selfishness and stayed knitted together as a people of God. God's Spirit, sent by Jesus after he ascended into heaven, has been alive and active in the world and in the hearts of those who believe and trust in his ways. Those first disciples had to figure out how to organize themselves in a world that was against them. The ways of the world are still against us. Here in the 21st century, the gift of time has become maybe even more precious than the gift of money.

So, what is the faithful response to all of this "sinful" behavior? We can't work our way out of sin, Luther believed. But we do have free will. So. Care enough. Slow down enough. Pray enough. Discern more. Speak up. Speak out. How do we love God and others more in our lives? How do we use our gifts and resources to God's Glory?

As we celebrate the gift of God's Holy Spirit on Sunday, May 20, let us work to advance God's ways in the world. Worshipping regularly with your brothers and sisters in the faith will help you and help us figure how to do that. As another school year ends, we look forward to the summer ahead. I am, PB

"Christmas in July" by collecting first-aid items to benefit Mary's Shelter in Reading. Mary's Shelter's mission is to acknowledge that life begins at conception and is worthy of protection. Mary's Shelter provides housing and a Christ-centered program of guidance and support for women facing a crisis during pregnancy. Women must receive counseling, attend in-house parenting and life-skill classes and adhere to the program covenants which offer structure, self-discipline and guidance. Council Corner

Zion's Church Council met May 8, 2018. There was discussion about qualifying uses of endowment fund money and the proper procedure to request money from the fund. All requests need to be submitted on the appropriate endowment form. An endowment fund request for \$500 by Carissa Miller for a dental mission trip to Honduras was approved. The drum circle fund of \$375.52 (which was left over from a church dinner fundraiser) was

discussed and it was decided to use this money to buy either drums or other needed musical instruments.

Pastor Bruce reported the Alzheimer Association will hold a Memory Café which will be reviewed afterwards to determine if there is enough interest to hold the Café monthly. Also discussed was the possibility of holding training to start an Alzheimer's caregiver support group.

Committee reports were presented. WELCA will be providing a meal for Berk's Festival of Faith at Bern Church and doing a Christmas in July collection for Mary's Shelter. Property reported the social hall will be repainted, and Kistler-Obrien is on schedule to complete the fire alarm installation. Possible future projects discussed were getting security cameras or motion detector lights installed and padded kneeling cushions at the altar rail for communion. Media Planning Committee does not have a budget this year, so all purchase requests need to be brought to Council for approval.

All photos for the directory have been taken, and we are waiting for the final draft. The Bishop's Advisory Committee will meet and report to Council on May 10th. Administrative assistant, Amanda Grow reported that sometimes when she is coming to work in the morning, she is finding the doors are not all locked. Council would like to remind all members to be careful about locking the doors when leaving the church.

God's Work, Our Hands is a Lutheran Wide Day of Service on September 9th. Pastor Bruce will discuss with the Hamburg Cluster to see if anyone is doing anything special that day which we could be a part of. If anyone has any suggestions, let Pastor Bruce or Eileen Puglia know.

The hosting of Family Promise in July has been postponed until the fire detection system has been installed.


Richard and Donna Long will represent Zion's Lutheran at the annual Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod Assembly at the Mohegan Sun arena in Wilkes-Barre on June 8-9. Congregational representatives will have the opportunity to participate in various service projects, visit nearby Bear Creek Camp, and participate in plenary sessions related to the cooperative and collaborative work of our 260 congregations. Pastor Bruce will also attend the event.

Health is a family matter.

This is why Zion's Evangelical Church is hosting Life Line Screening, the nation's leading provider of preventive health screenings on Friday, June 8, 2018. The screenings provided focus on vascular disease, a leading cause of illness, death and disability among men.

Screenings are fast, painless and affordable. Three key tests check for blocked carotid arteries, an irregular heart rhythm called atrial fibrillation, and high blood pressure, which are the three leading risk factors for stroke. Nearly 800,000 strokes will occur this year, taking a life approximately every four minutes. Other tests check for abdominal aortic aneurysms and hardening of the arteries in the legs. A bone density screening to assess osteoporosis risk is also offered and is appropriate for both men and women. Many events also offer blood tests, including cholesterol, glucose and c-reactive protein screenings, as well as takehome colon cancer early detection tests. Screening packages start at \$139. Single tests cost around \$70. For more information regarding the screenings or to schedule an appointment, call 1-888-653-6441 or go to www.lifelinescreening.com/communitycircle or text the word circle to 797979. Pre-registration is required.
