Letter from the Pastor

Dear Friends,

"While Paul was waiting for them in Athens, **he was deeply distressed to see that the city was full of idols.** So, he argued in the synagogue with the Jews and the devout persons, and also in the marketplace every day with those who happened to be there. Also, some Epicurean and Stoic philosophers debated with him. Some said, "What does this babbler want to say?" Others said, "He seems to be a proclaimer of foreign divinities." (This was because Paul was telling the good news about Jesus and the resurrection.) Acts 17:16-19

Read on beginning with verse 19 to find out what happens to the apostle Paul next.

Paul found himself in a strange and unfriendly place that had never heard the story of Jesus. The Athenians thought he was a Christian philosopher at first. They called him a "babbler" someone who picks up scraps of learning literally like a "cock-sparrow". (Much like private Internet only spirituality) Jesus and Anastasis (which means resurrection) were mistaken for foreign gods. A great debate in the Areopagus would follow. Paul does well in his speech that begins at verse 22. Paul speaks of a "living God" that is for all people.

Here in the 21st century we are in an equaling confusing situation. Only instead of not knowing Jesus at all, the intent of Jesus message is what is hotly debated. Who are the Christians of today? How do they practice their faith? Do they all believe the same things? How do they make a difference in the world? Why is there so much religious unrest? Why do politicians feel the need to quote scripture to justify themselves? Life is a swirling mix of thought that is confusing to say the least. We need God and each other to help sort it all out.

How do we "stay grounded" in our **Lutheran** faith? What are the touchstones of our life together as people who are a part of Zion's Lutheran Church? Why do we Lutherans do what we do? Are we/How do we "transmit" our Lutheran faith to the next generation? These are important questions for us to ask ourselves as we prepare to begin a new school year.

Some guidance is due here. After all, Zion's Lutheran has been around since 1759. That is a long time. In 2019, that will be 260 years! Try these:

 Habitually worshiping with others. 2. Generously giving. 3. Daily praying. 4. Serving others often. 5. Being an active citizen 6. Working to build up the whole community. 7. Reflecting on the old, old story contained in the Bible and learning its' lessons. 8. Being one who "ministers" in daily life as I do my work 9. Connecting my faith to my personal actions. 10. Seeing God as active and alive in the world. 11. Thinking of "we" instead of just "me". 12. Slowing down. Thinking. Counting your blessings when you do. 13. Cultivating the garden of your mind by continually learning.

Try some of these activities as you strive to be faithful amidst all of the questions and confusion. I am always open for discussion. Just a reminder: Our Sunday School resumes September 9th at 9:15 a.m. You can bring your questions with you.

Word and Sacrament will sustain us. It always has. PB

Labyrinth

Members have asked me questions about the labyrinth, so here is the latest update. We hired Bryn Kolbe (former Scout Master that helped supervise the building of the labyrinth last year) to finish the labyrinth for us. The pile of dark stone and bricks at the labyrinth will be used in the finally Phase II of construction. We're waiting for the last 3 engraved bricks to arrive to finish this project, and for Bryn to fit us into his schedule. The plain bricks that are taken out and replaced with the engraved bricks, will then be used to outline the entrance walkway to the labyrinth and the flower bed between the entrance and the shrubs next to the parking lot light pole. Additions to the labyrinth will have the same colored finishing stones as the labyrinth has.

Placed in the flower bed will be a big sign with a picture of the labyrinth and the words "COME WALK THE LABYRINTH". There will be a water tight plastic container attached to the sign to hold pamphlets explaining the purpose, the history and ways to use a labyrinth.


Garden news

IHartHarvest. Inc. All at GBFB,

Due to weather etcetera, we are expecting maybe some +65,000 pounds of potatoes to be harvested this season. There is 5.7 Acres (down from previous near years of 8).

Group Harvest Sessions can start in August, but most likely in earnest the month of September through October. There could be more of potatoes, but my test digs don't indicate that so much.

Carrots are expected to be October on, maybe some +20,000 pounds. There is 1 acre. Foldable crates for carrots are already in place.

Sweet Corn harvests every week are expected to start the first week of August. Sweet corn has to move out quickly before it makes heat in the bins and spoils, so decide NOW and let me know the best day you would like to receive some, and I'll try to work harvests accordingly. IE: to get it on your trucks for same day delivery as possible, or in your cooler. There are staggered sections or 4 being 1.25 acres. A startup of pallets and bins are already in place for the first pick of sweet corn harvest for the first week, or two, expected to start in 2 weeks through September if rains come now.

Family Promise We Promised!

Zion's is in need of a Family Promise Coordinator / Family Promise Committee. Our next host week is November 11th through 18th. The Coordinator / Family Promise Committee would help to coordinate dinner donations each evening, as well as overnight hosts, and site logistics. Training and information is available to help your efforts.

According to FamilyPromise.org, this program offers case management and shelter to homeless families in Berks County, allowing couples or single parents to remain with their children while being sheltered versus being separated by gender. This 90-day program offers enrichment to participants and volunteers alike and helps foster self-sufficiency and community engagement. They partner with congregations throughout Berks County, including Zion's, to provide emergency shelter, meals and assistance to homeless families for about one-third the cost of traditional shelters. Family Promise keeps families together and provides them with a safe, supportive and homelike environment. This is a successful program, with 85% of the families in the Hospitality Network successfully transitioned into permanent housing.

Strengthening the rights of women through fair trade and solidarity

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he life of Isabel Cristina de Souza Cunha and her family, who live in the city of Viamão in the state of Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil, changed radically in 1996. Brazil was going through a period of political and economic crisis, the number of people who were unemployed was growing fast, and both she and her husband, Harold, had lost their jobs.

For Isabel's family, as well as for thousands of other families, the struggle was for survival. Isabel and Harold's biggest concern was for the well-being of their children. Anderson (7), Eduardo (4), Francieli (3) and William (1). Employment opportunities were rare; sometimes she could find cleaning jobs, and her husband eventually found work as a mason. But there was no guarantee of either food on the table or the means to purchase basic necessities.

In the midst of this uncertainty, Isabel chose to look for opportunities rather than sit still. For years she had felt the need to work on something that would make a difference, not just for her but for her entire community. It was during this time she heard about the fair- and solidaritytrade movement, which focuses on people working together to make sure that their skills are recognized and they are compensated fairly. She learned how women who had marketable skillsets like craft-making, sewing and preparing food joined in groups, associations and cooperatives to produce and sell their goods together.

When the Good Samaritan Child Nursery (linked to the Evangelical Church of the Lutheran Confession in Brazil), where Isabel's children attended school, expressed concern about the number of families suffering as a result of the financial crisis, Isabel saw her opportunity. The nursery proposed that the parents form a business cooperative, and she and her husband immediately decided to get involved.

Forming the cooperative took work - a lot of work. But Isabel persisted, learning, working and caring for her family.

In the early years, Isabel and the other memoers had to learn a lot, including how to run a business. In a field dominated by men, she and the other women ensured the cooperative's board of directors was composed only of women.



"The issues were many, but slowly we learned how to do it," Isabel says.

Today, the cooperative is called Cooperbom. The challenges continue, especially in the areas of bringing together the various groups involved in this co-op and navigating competition from larger bakeries and food production businesses.

To assist them in overcoming these challenges. Cooperbom decided to join the Fair and Supportive Trade Network project, which was launched by the Lutheran Foundation of Diakonia in 2012 with partnership and support from ELCA World Hunger. The network brings together enterprises like Cooperbom, focusing on the areas of food production, handicrafts, manufacturing and recycling. Cooperbom quickly became one of the most valued partners in this project.

The Fair and Supportive Trade Network is opening up spaces within Brazilian Lutheran communities and Lutheran schools. Now instead of acquiring food and other products from larger companies. Lutheran communities have the opportunity to buy from enterprises like Cooperbom, increasing the income of women. The network also assists enterprises like Cooperbom in overcoming obstacles by providing training and support for women entrepreneurs on topics like sustainability, management, quality assurance and gender justice.

"I think of my history, the problems and opportunities that have brought me here, and I see how much the Cooperbom has grown and developed after joining the Fair and Supportive Trade Network." Isabel says. "As a result of this support, we have improved the quality of our products. We are able to continually invest in improving our enterprise and we have gained new consumers. The improvement of the income of Cooperbom's associates and their quality of life is a direct result of working with the Fair and Supportive Trade Network."


