Dear Zion's Members and Friends,

Bishop Samuel Zeiser and 2 of the 3 members of the Advisory Council met with about 50 members of Zion's Lutheran Church on, Thursday, May 31 to answer questions about the 3 recommendations that the group presented to the Congregation Council at its' May meeting. In prayer, we should be lifting up our concerns as a central part of what we do. The Bishop's overall message was that pastor and congregation should work towards practicing forgiveness and reconciliation while we engage a counselor to help us. This counselor will be paid for by the Synod. As I write these words, I await a return phone call to schedule my first appointment with the counselor. Bishop Zeiser agreed to have another meeting with the congregation, when we are halfway through the process. That meeting will occur about 5-6 weeks into the process subject to scheduling. Stay tuned as to when.

"Working together for the good of all" like the passage above from Paul's Letter to the Church in Galatia says, is a difficult thing to do. When the Apostle Paul wrote those words around the year 55 AD the Galatian congregation was embroiled in an argument over whether or not Gentiles had to become Jews first before they could become Christians. Paul insisted that one becomes right with God only by faith in Christ and not by the performance of good works, ritual observances and the like.

We live in a very contentious age. At every level of society there appears to be a moral struggle for justice, unity, and equality. Whether it is the school board budget meeting, the zoning hearing, or some world leaders trying to work for peace and security, everyone has an opinion and all those opinions seem to be different. Disrespect is now the norm. Individuals are tried and convicted for their beliefs by anonymous Internet trolls who have nothing to fear when it comes to their words and actions.

Zion's Lutheran Church is a Christian congregation founded on and focused on the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, the Savior of the World. Christ's humble life of service to God and others stands as a central mirror for all who believe in God's saving and abundant grace. **Being united in our desire to reach all people with this Gospel Good News is why our congregation exists.** Our identity and our life together as a congregation is different than what happens at the fire company, or the community service club, the Grange Hall, or the citizen's rally. Our behavior is supposed to be different, our thinking different, our actions different. **But is it always?**

We gather week after week, year after year, in prayer, praise and thanksgiving to give God the Glory by our "individual" and our "corporate" words and deeds. This begins with the practice of confession and ends with the words of absolution. One thing that makes us "different" is that we are supposed to be able to recognize and admit our sinful, prideful behaviors. Maybe we need to be not so quick in pointing out the faults of others without looking at ourselves first. With God's help, hopefully we are able to modify those behaviors.

In worship, we get down on our knees and we say: "Most Merciful God, we confess that we are captive to sin and cannot free ourselves. We have sinned against you, in thought, word and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. For the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ, have mercy on us. Forgive us, renew us and lead us, so that we may delight in your will and walk in your ways, to the glory of your holy name. Note the emphasis is on "we" and "our". (The bold type is my extra addition.) We all have a part to play in building up the faith community that is Zion's Lutheran Church. As an ordained pastor, for 32 years now, it still is humbling for me to speak the words of absolution after we say these words together.

May God strengthen us in our resolve to be "God's people", united and welcoming to all.

Council Corner

July 2018

Donna Long gave a report from the Synod Assembly, which had a theme of "Sharing Ministries, Building Relationships." There were service project opportunities as well as the guest speaker from Argentina, Pastor Gustavo Gomez Pascua. Council expressed thanks to our delegates, Rich & Donna Long. Next year's Assembly will be a 1-day event in Hazleton.

Committee reports were shared. Worship and Music reported the cancellation of the July 1st service in Shoey Park. We look forward to our outdoor service on June 17th at Zion's, joining with Fellowship Committee for brunch after the service.

Christian Education was pleased to announce Vernie Noecker as their new Committee Chairperson, beginning with their August meeting. We thank Henry Seidel for his years of service in this position. Property Committee had much news to share, including completion of the centrally monitored fire detection system and repair of the stained-glass window. Staff and committee chairs, as well as groups using the Church, will be informed of fire alarm procedures. Please see a Property Committee member for any questions.

Council was delighted to approve the reorganization of the Youth Ministry Planning Committee, under the leadership of Tiffany Gruber and Brian Moroney, to oversee the congregation's program of ministry activities for and by the youth of Zion's Church and the community. They look forward to providing more opportunities for our youth members in the areas of Fun, Service, and Learning.

Council approved Zion's as a host site for a monthly Memory Café, to be led by facilitators from the Lehigh Valley Health Network, Hamburg office, through a grant program, which extends through June 2019.

Zion's is in need of a Family Promise Coordinator, in preparation for our November host commitment. Coordinators help to arrange dinner donations each evening, as well as overnight hosts. Training is available through Family Promise. Please see Eileen Puglia or Pastor Bruce if you are interested or would like more information.

Per the recommendation of Personnel, and approval of Christian Ed, Council approved a change in the frequency of the clearances required in our Child/Youth Protection Guidelines, from every 3 years to every 5 years. This is now in line with current state requirements for our volunteers.

Phase II of the Labyrinth was approved by Council, which will include the entrance and completed area for signage next to the light pole.

SYNOD ARTICLE

It was an honor and privilege to represent Zion's Lutheran Church at the 2018 NEPA Synod Assembly June 8 and 9 in Wilkes-Barre. What a wonderful experience sharing prayer, song and worship with 400 other Lutherans. The Assembly had a guest speaker, Pastor President Gustavo Gomez Pascua, the Bishop of Argentina and Uruguay. He also accompanied many of our songs with his guitar.

The theme of the Assembly this year was Sharing Ministries and Building Relationships. There were many service projects to choose from over our three-hour lunchtime. We chose to drive to the local SPCA, where Rich was put to work raking leaves and debris around the buildings, and Donna knotted little blankets for the kittens and cats while enjoying building a relationship with three other Assembly women.

Two of the more interesting displays throughout the concourse were Diakon and United Lutheran Seminary. Diakon is celebrating 150 years of social services. They started by establishing Tressler Soldiers' Orphanage after the Civil War and followed with the opening of the Topton Lutheran Home for Orphans. The United Lutheran Seminary is the result of the merger of Gettysburg and Philadelphia Seminaries. It was very encouraging to learn that over 70 students enrolled last fall. Pastor Bruce also had two tables filled with displays, including information about our community garden. This led to a church in Schuylkill County wanting to come visit our garden and getting information to start their own community garden. Thus, Pastor Bruce exemplified the theme of the synod assembly, Sharing Ministries and Building Relationships.

Bishop Zeiser and Vice President Barbara Belon made many good points in their messages to us. Humility and gentleness were stressed. Some of the quotes which we felt were relevant to our congregation follow:

"We must get along." "We can't allow differences to get in our way." "We must engage in ministry together. It's so much more fun and we can get so much more accomplished." "We must live in Grace." "It's not all about what you do for the church." "Don't be manipulative if you're in charge." "Practice love, mercy and compassion." "Love your neighbors." and "God is Love."

A parting plea was for us to focus on how we can build relationships. "We must open our doors and go

out and be the church in our outreach to the community."

Next year, the NEPA Synod Assembly will be held in Hazleton and only be one day. In 2020, the Assembly will be multiple days at Kalahari to elect a bishop. We strongly recommend that any of you who have never attended a synod assembly, do so. It was a very moving experience.


