Letter from the Pastor: Dear Zion Lutheran Members and Friends,



King David gets much of the credit for writing the Book of Psalms. Did you know that there are different kinds of Psalms? The Psalter is the hymnal of ancient Israel, compiled from older collections of lyrics for use in the temple of Zerubbabel. Most were written to accompany Israel's worship life. Hymns including some subtypes like enthronement hymns, (celebrating kingship) and Songs of Zion (ones that express devotion to the Holy City); Laments (asking for deliverance); Songs of Trust (expressing confidence); Thanksgivings (showing gratitude for deliverance), Sacred History (recounting the story of God's dealings); Royal psalms (for coronation or weddings), Wisdom psalms (meditations on life and the ways of God) and there are liturgies (written for a specific occasion). These Psalms reflect Israel's national heritage. Much of the Old Testament tells the story of Israel's rise and fall as a nation.

Martin Luther loved the Psalms and was an expert on them. His devotion to them probably fueled his love of and promotion of congregational singing, which became a new thing for the German Christians to do. German pride rose during the Reformation.

Berks County enjoyed wonderful weather and record-breaking attendance at this year's World War 2 weekend at the Reading Airport, June 7-9. The 75th Anniversary of the Allies invasion of Normandy was remembered. During that time, nations rose and nations fell. As you read this, we are heading into the 242nd celebration of our country's independence. Take a moment and read these relevant words from Psalm 144: 9-15 NRSV (bold, italics, and underline are mine):

"I will sing a new song to you, O God; upon the ten-stringed harp I will play to you, the one who **gives victory to kings**, who **rescues his servant** David. Rescue me from the cruel sword, and **deliver me** from the hand of aliens, whose mouths speak lies and whose right hands are false. May our sons in their youth be **like plants full grown**, our daughters like **corner pillars**, cut for the building of a palace. May our barns **be filled**, with produce of every kind; may our sheep **increase** by thousands, by tens of thousands in our fields, and may our cattle **be heavy** with young. May there be **no breach in the walls, no exile, and no cry of distress in our streets.** Happy are the people to whom such blessings fall; happy are the people whose God is the Lord."

Of course, as this 4th of July celebration approaches, *we want what is best* for our nation. **But how do we get there?** Our state and our county, the same question? Township and Borough? Yes, they need help, too. An important question to ask yourself is this: Are you able to see just how easy it might be to fall into what is known as "civil religion"? America first. During World War 2 and the days that followed it was easy to be united against a common enemy. But times have changed. Our worst enemy seems to be ourselves. **Does God really favor one nation over another?**

As Lutherans, we believe, that making the world a better, a more just and peaceful place is the call of every baptized believer. The global Lutheran World Federation includes 75 million people from over 100 countries. We know from our relationships with them that people in other places are hurting. Our own nation is unsettled as it tries to answer the question "How do we make our national life better"? Sometimes, we get God and Country all mixed up and confused. Just how do we make it better? Were our founding fathers Christian or not? Were they "deists" or "atheists"? Did things really go downhill when "they" took prayer out of the schools, like people like to say? As the most diverse nation on the planet, what is it that unites us as citizens? In the Bible, the people of Israel struggled with their nationhood. We are struggling now. May our prayer be that God's spirit guides our nation, its' leaders, and its' citizens along just and loving pathways. PB



Nurse Family Partnership in Berks County

In April Zion's WELCA had the manager for the Berks County Nurse Family Partnership speak about their program at our meeting. It is an evidence-based health program with over 40 years of evidence showing significant improvements in the health and lives of first-time moms and their children living in poverty. A registered nurse helps guide first time mothers through the emotional, physical and social challenges they face for a healthy birth. This mentoring continues through the child's first 2 years.

For our Christmas in July project WELCA decided to support this program with some of the small (and a few large) items the nurses use in teaching the moms to work and play with their babies. In July there will be small string backpacks available in the narthex with a list of items they find useful in their program. To participate in this project, take a backpack and purchase a few (or a lot) of the small items listed and return to the church by the end of July. Larger items don't need a backpack: they are booster feeding chair, Graco on the go pack and play, and safety gates.

The speaker also noted that they take donations of used strollers, feeding chairs and activity centers for infants. (Of course, they should be in good shape)

This is an opportunity to make a difference in the lives of tomorrow's children and their families.

It was discussed at our council meeting about the fire system installed by Kistler O'Brien. We got our bill for the annual inspection fee of \$550.45. Since it was installed, we have had monthly failures wo we will talk to them about getting our warranty extended.

We borrowed \$30,000 from Vanguard to pay off Ronnie Folk Inc. for the parking lot and will pay ourselves back. We will be recognizing our 7 young people who graduated from High School and college within the next few weeks.

The child safety guidelines were reviewed and slight changes were made. Harley Ludy and Michael Dotterer were recognized by the Berks County Community Foundation and received a \$4,000 grant to be used for their puppetry program to purchase sound equipment.

Family Promise still needs a coordinator or Pastor will assume that position. We will not be doing Christmas time with Family Promise.

\$1,000 was received from the Labyrinth Committee to be used for the parking lot paving. We will have no Council meeting in July. We are in a deficit of \$34,840.17 for the month of June so far.








He's Coming Again!






