Dear Zion Members and Friends,

I can no longer remain silent on the issue of immigration.

The amazing work of Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS) is now being publicly attacked by those who stoke the fires of hatred and further tear down the fabric of community that is this country. Diversity is the very strength of our republic.

LIRS is an 80-year-old ministry that has worked to resettle refugees since they began fleeing Hitler's Nazi German regime in 1939. More than 500,000 human beings have been relocated and welcomed by LIRS, in truth demonstrating the extraordinary compassion of many volunteers and congregations that did and are doing this work. Long after governments give up trying, the Church of Jesus Christ and its faithful, compassionate people continue make a daily difference in the lives of the suffering and homeless people of the world. LIRS has long advocated for comprehensive immigration reform from Congress, stood up for separated families, spoke out for orphaned children, and knows how to efficiently use the government funds that it receives in providing community-based ways that are far cheaper than building and funding large detention centers. Lutherans give leadership to the largest United Nations Refugee camps around the world. We know how to do this work. We know what the Bible tells us to do. Lutheran congregations in El Paso, Texas, to name just one place, are doing great work today.

Our own Berks County leadership knows how to care for people in humane, caring, and efficient ways despite the political firestorm that now surrounds the Bern Township Family Residential Center. Many who oppose aid to refugees and asylum seekers would do well to have their own DNA tests and study their own Family Tree so that they can better understand the immigrant heritage of our great nation.

Biblical hospitality is needed now more than ever. It is biblically mandated for Christians to welcome the widow, the orphan, the stranger, the refugee and the "alien" in our midst. Please read your Bible carefully which is a Lutheran tradition in itself!

The Lutheran World Federation is a global church with more than 70 million people in over 100 countries. LIRS is a ministry arm of our Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. To lump LIRS into the current maelstrom of hate is wrong.

Years ago, I helped establish the Greater Reading Immigration Project which continues to provide college support for our local high school graduates who were brought to this country when they were young, by their parents. Every school district in Berks County has students who are undocumented because going to school is the right of every child in this country. You could find out more about the Berks County Community Foundation Scholarship program at readinggrip.org

Lutherans have been in Berks County for more than 275 years. We know our history and the roots of our people. Many of those first refugees that were relocated to this country were Germans. Our local and national diversity is a true blessing from the Almighty God. Last week, the Reading Eagle reported that 44 people from 18 different countries became naturalized citizens in a ceremony at the Berks County Court House. Our diversity grows!



<u>Martin Luther's Small Catechism – Introduction</u> – Printed here for your reflection

Our Father in heaven. What is

this? **OR** *What does this mean?* With these words God wants to attract us, so that we come to believe he is truly our Father and we are truly his children, in order that we may ask him boldly and with complete confidence, just as loving children ask their loving father.

The First Petition. Hallowed be your name. *What is this?* **OR** *What does this mean?* It is true that God's name is holy in itself, but we ask in this prayer that it may also become holy in and among us.*How does this come about?* Whenever the word of God is taught clearly and purely and we, as God's children, also live holy lives according to it. To this end help us, dear Father in heaven! However, whoever teaches and lives otherwise than the word of God teaches, dishonors the name of God among us. Preserve us from this, heavenly Father!

The Second Petition. Your kingdom come. *What is this?* **OR** *What does this mean?* In fact, God's kingdom comes on its own without our prayer, but we ask in this prayer that it may also come to us. *How does this come about?* Whenever our heavenly Father gives us his Holy Spirit, so that through the Holy Spirit's grace we believe God's holy word and live godly lives here in time and hereafter in eternity.

The Third Petition. Your will be done on earth as in heaven. *What is this?* **OR** *What does this mean?* In fact, God's good and gracious will comes about without our prayer, but we ask in this prayer that it may also come about in and among us. *How does this come about?*

Whenever God breaks and hinders every evil scheme and will—as are present in the will of the devil, the world, and our flesh; that would not allow us to hallow God's name and would prevent the coming of his kingdom, and instead whenever God strengthens us and keeps us steadfast in his word and in faith until the end of our lives. This is God's gracious and good will.

The Fourth Petition. Give us today our daily bread. *What is this?* **OR** *What does this mean?*

In fact, God gives daily bread without our prayer, even to all evil people, but we ask in this prayer that God cause us to recognize what our daily bread is and to receive it with thanksgiving. *What then does "daily bread" mean?* Everything included in the necessities and nourishment for our bodies, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, farm, fields, livestock, money, property, an upright spouse, upright children, upright members of the household, upright and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, decency, honor, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like.

The Fifth Petition. Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us. *What is this?* OR *What does this mean?* We ask in this prayer that our heavenly Father would not regard our sins nor deny these petitions on their account, for we are worthy of nothing for which we ask, nor have we earned it. Instead we ask that God would give us all things by grace, for we daily sin much and indeed deserve only punishment. So, on the other hand, we, too, truly want to forgive heartily and to do good gladly to those who sin against us.

The Sixth Petition. Save us from the time of trial. *What is this?* **OR** *What does this mean?* It is true that God tempts no one, but we ask in this prayer that God would preserve and keep us, so that the devil, the world, and our flesh may not deceive us or mislead us into false belief, despair, and other great and shameful sins, and that, although we may be attacked by them, we may finally prevail and gain the victory.

The Seventh Petition. And deliver us from evil. *What is this?* **OR** *What does this mean?* We ask in this prayer, as in a summary, that our Father in heaven may deliver us from all kinds of evil—affecting body or soul, property or reputation—and at last, when our final hour comes, may grant us a blessed end and take us by grace from this valley of tears to himself in heaven.

Conclusion. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen. *What is this?* **OR** *What does this mean?* That I should be certain that such petitions are acceptable to and heard by our Father in heaven, for he himself commanded us to pray like this and has promised to hear us. "Amen, amen" means "Yes, yes, it is going to come about just like this."






