Dear Zion's Members and Friends,

Our lessons today (Oct. 27th) from Jeremiah, from Romans, and from John's Gospel, were all pivotal passages in propelling Martin Luther's faith and thinking about God and about the life of faith.

It is 502 years ago now that Martin Luther decided to go public with his thinking, taking on the whole world in debate about how church life and faith should be. God's grace should be primary for the church because God's grace in Jesus Christ is what brings salvation to the world and to each human being.

Romans 3:23 says that "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and they are now justified by his grace as a gift through the redemption that is ours in Jesus Christ." There is nothing to fear because God took care of it by sending Jesus to this world. No amount of good works can get it done, God's sacrifice of Jesus breaks the chains of our human bondage to sin and we are set free to love and serve our neighbor. "We are no longer slaves to sin" as Jesus says in John Chapter 8 today, the saving action of Jesus is the truth and the truth changes everything. We are free to love God and love our neighbor.

The hope that we find in Jeremiah 31 drives our faith life forward. Those Israelites had a memory problem. God wrote their life instructions down on stone tablets and gave it to Moses to give to them, but they were stubborn and didn't want to listen. Over and over again in the Old Testament we can read about their stubborn ways. So Jeremiah tells them that God will write the instructions right directly on their hearts and they will know God. They will know what God has done for them. They will never forget that God forgives them always, no matter what. God promises to be their God and God sustains those whom he loves. Noah through the flood. Abraham and Sarah in their old age with a child. Jacob as he wrestled with the angel by the ford of the Jabbok River. Joseph after his brothers abandoned him and sold him into slavery. God broke the Israelites out of their slavery in Egypt. Sustained them through 40 years in their long walk to the promised land with manna from heaven and water from the rock. As they entered the Promised Land and took it to be their own. A young boy with a couple of stones defeats a large warrior. With a wise king who commands a child to be cut in half and shared with 2 supposed moms-knowing that the real mom will speak out for the child. After foreign invaders sweep their country away and only a remnant remains, God promises to send them a Savior, a Messiah, a new commander. The ways of this Christ

are spelled out for all to see, for all to study, for all to grasp, and struggle with. When gather in these pews, in this place, we try to do just that.

When we gather in worship, we celebrate our Lutheran Christian faith. It is a faith that has Christ at its' center. The Jesus' message of loving God and loving our neighbor is at its' center, too. Ours is a faith that digs in and works hard to understand.

Ours is a faith that gets its' hands dirty when others want to use gloves and keep their distance from the tough issues of sexuality, and race relations, and care for the environment, and what to do about immigrants and refugees, about how to be a church on the public square.

Ours is a faith that engages the real problems of human life. That is why the orphanage at Topton was founded, the college known as Muhlenberg was established, the camp at Bear Creek developed, the shelter known as Opportunity House down in Reading, the giant food pantry now known as Helping Harvest, all of those and more, in order to help young and old practice their faith in the real world.

Ours is a faith that unites and includes rather than dividing and excluding. It is why we are in fellowship with so many other denominations. We collaborate by nature, all for the common good of all and not just for the good of some.

Ours is a faith that provides support to those who were formerly addicted. Ours is a faith that grows vegetables and packs bags, and lifts boxes, and picks up potatoes off of the ground, to help feed those who are hungry. Ours is a faith that teaches about life and faith, and encourages all ages to keep on learning. Ours is a faith that splashes water on baby heads, and sometimes grown-up heads. Ours is a faith that knows of the mystery and power behind the simple meal of bread and wine. Ours is a faith that focusses on what God promises and on what God does for us, through us, in us to change the things.

It is not what we do but what God does that makes the ultimate difference. God loves all and so should we. God loves each of us and God wants each of us to love God back. When we do these things, we are sustained. We are strengthened. We have meaning and purpose in our lives. Let's keep doing these things, shall we? Pastor Bruce Osterhout

Sometimes it's hard to remember what you did yesterday. Not for Ernie Heckman. Ernie is able to recall the building project as if it was yesterday, not 50 years ago. For our new church building, he served as Chairman of the Study Committee, General Chairman of the Planning Council, as well as Chairman of the Building Commission.

Sitting down with Ernie to discuss the construction project, from the idea, the first stake in the ground, and through the construction, he recalls Zion's journey. What is also evident is his recollection of the feelings of himself, the leadership, and the congregation as they entered into this unchartered territory. There was no land and there was no money. These problems were both rectified. There was vision. The accessible design was ahead of its time.

Throughout our talk, a message of faith was most evident. The mortgage was paid in 16 years. A drop in membership, to be expected with any change, was met with a growth in members when the new building opened its doors. Ernie summed it up beautifully when he stated, "We were blessed. The people were faithful."


